




## Digital Round Table in April

Seminar at PTS Symposium Open to All Interested Parties

In order to allow more interested stakeholders like suppliers and chemical manufacturers to participate in the discussions about better deinkability of digital prints, INGEDE has decided to open the Round Table to a more seminar-like meeting, to be followed by a working group with limited participants. This time the first part will take place together with the PTS Deinking Symposium on 29 April: There will be introductory presentations about the current trends in digital printing, the status of the round table and developments in deinkability of inkjet inks. After the presentations at the Deinking Symposium, two more hours of Round Table meeting will give room to discussions about new developments, among them better deinkable inkjet inks. One example are encapsulated pigments devel-

oped by KAO in Japan: These pigments are expected to aggregate for better image quality and, as an additional benefit, to be better deinkable. Tests under Japanese deinking conditions point this way, tests according to INGEDE Method 11p are currently on the way. More details on how to proceed in further cooperations and developments can be discussed the following day, Friday 30 April, at the working group meeting on invitation by Myllykoski's Lang Paper mill in Ettringen close to Munich. This group will be limited to those who have been working together with INGEDE for the last years and/or wish to continuously cooperate for a constructive dialogue.

## ERPC in favour to extend “Declaration”

On 16 March 2010 the European Recovered Paper Council (ERPC) held its regular spring meeting. For INGEDE the major item on the agenda was the future of the European Declaration on Paper Recycling. All delegates present expressed their willingness to continue with this type of self-commitment. One key point will be the new target for the recycling rate. It is quite obvious that it can not climb with the same increment as in the previous years. Introducing ecological criteria of increased recycling are a possible way for judging to which extent recycling makes sense. Even more emphasis than in the current Declara-

tion will be given to qualitative targets. All stakeholders should develop ideas over this summer. Within INGEDE, the Working Group DIP Quality Management is the forum to discuss these ideas. The revision work will start at the autumn meeting of the ERPC in September. Its Technical Committee, which was initiated by INGEDE in 2007, will be the first addressee for the work. The major part of the revision should be finalised by spring 2011. It has to be decided in September whether the normal meeting frequency of the Technical Committee will be sufficient or whether there are additional meetings necessary.
